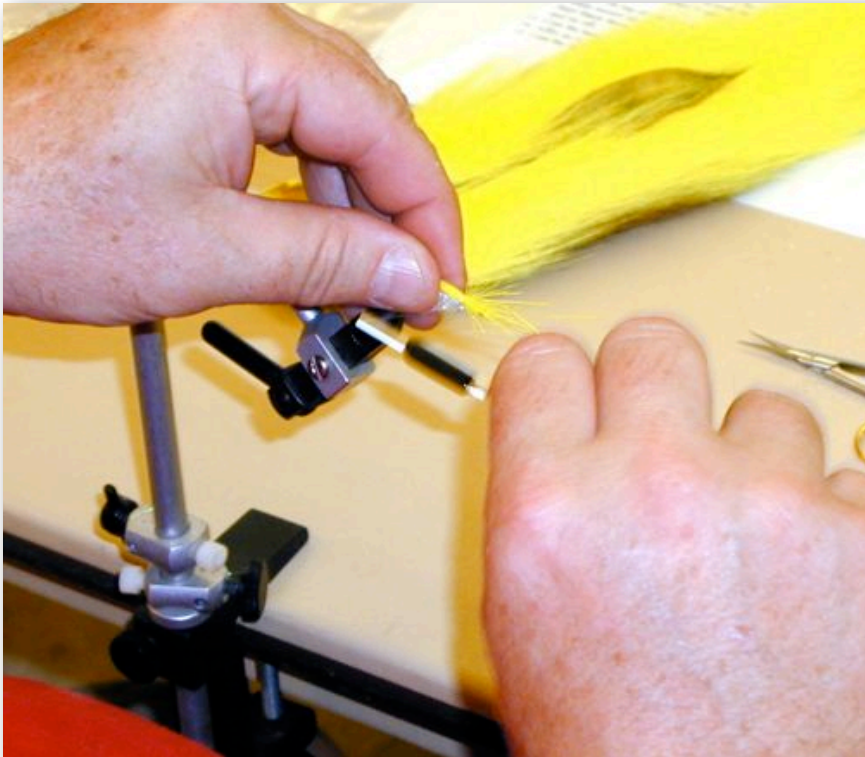

Author Dave Ames explores new territory for fly fishing writers and rewards readers with every word.

Author and fishing guide Dave Ames was our guest speaker in September.

Dave Ames has spent a lot of time doing things he loves: Fishing, writing, playing music, working with his hands, and reading. Along the way he's put food on the table and gas in the tank by guiding, writing articles and books, and recently, opening a secluded "hideaway" called the Lodgepole Inn on the Little Blackfoot River in Montana.

His first job out of college as a hydrologist working in a government-supplied cubicle lasted about one Montana winter. When spring came, he took off to*See DAVE AMES Page 2*

fish and never looked back. For the past 20 plus years, Dave has invested his time enriching his life instead of his pocketbook and he shared some of that true wealth with the club recently.

He's a fine storyteller and that comes through both in person and on the pages of his books. His latest, *Dances with Sharks*, which was published last year, is his third. It was preceded by *True Love and the Woolley Bugger*, published in 1996, and *A Good Life Wasted, or 20 Years As a Fishing Guide*, published in 2003.

Time Well Spent

Dave admits that he wasn't setting any writing speed records during the seven years between his first and second books, but it was worth the wait. During those years he honed his skills to further develop a voice that is genuinely unique in fly-fishing literature.

Most fly-fishing books fall into two general categories, the tactical "how to" books (writers like Dave Hughes and the late Gary LaFontaine) and the first person "anecdotal" books (writers like John Gierach and the late Robert Travers). Dave Ames is able to bridge both styles and create novellas that you can hardly put down.

For me, his most compelling work so far is the title story in *Dances with Sharks*. In it, he writes about confronting and coming to grips with advanced, aggressive prostate cancer amidst a wild, free-wheeling, cast of fishing addicted characters in a place called Redcoat Key in the Caribbean. It's a must read.

"My characters are all based on real people, but they're also composites," Ames says. "Heidi, in *A Good Life Wasted* isn't a real person, but she's a combination of a lot of the girls I knew when I was growing up in Butte. It's was a tough town and the girls grew up to be strong, unique women. That's Heidi."

"*True Love and the Woolley Bugger*" is a fast moving, fly fishing meets Woodstock series of funny, coming of age, poignant "memoirs" *A Good Life Wasted* moves Dave's work into a new realm. It's a finely-crafted novel, based on real events, that delves more deeply into its characters and their relationships with each other, their pasts, their fly fishing and themselves.

His latest book, *Dances with Sharks*, is a series of three memoir/novellas. It showcases Ames gift at

combining character development, history, humor, philosophy, and a strong environmental ethic into stories that hook you in and don't let go. Where will he go from here?

"I don't read other fly fishing writers very much because I want to stay focused on where I'm trying to go with my work. I don't want to be accused of 'borrowing' from someone else," he adds. "I would like to write a third-person novel but right now I need to make some money. So I have a book proposal on tactics out for review and hope that generates some interest. Tactical books sell."

Dave's prostate cancer is currently non active, and he still has a lust for exploring the frontiers of fly fishing as well as writing.

Changing Times

"When I started guiding, clients were happy to get white bread sandwiches with pimento spread for lunch. Today they ask 'Where's the brie?'" Dave reflected. "I also remember guiding on the Missouri in the 80's when we had 50 to 100 fish days. Those places are few and far between. I'd like to find as many more as I can."

the same steps in tying a specific pattern.

Tying enhances just about every other aspect of your fly fishing. You'll learn more about stream entomology and how to adjust standard patterns to meet specific needs and you'll also learn a lot about proper presentation. A fly that rides properly and has the right profile is key to improving your percentage of strikes.

October Speaker is Alaska Expert.

Over the past 30 years, this month's guest speaker, Richard DeLorenzo, lived and fished in Alaska and explored most of the State's Alaska wilderness areas.

He has experience as a wilderness river guide, fly fishing guide and pilot. He has pioneered an array of new fisheries in Alaska including discovering new runs of steelhead along the Alaska Coast and fly fishing for halibut and five species of salmon in the ocean off the floats of his plane.

His earned his native name "Kukuklek," which means the king fisher, when he showed the natives of Port Graham how to catch king salmon all year long.

His favorite fishing is catching large rainbow on dry flies and fishing at midnight during the smolt migration in the lake region of Alaska. He now lives with his family in Carlton along the Methow River.
