Mike Lawson shares the lowdown on nymph fishing from "top to bottom."



Mike Lawson international fly fishing guide, author, and expert on Idaho's renowned Henry's Fork, spoke on "Nymphing from Top to Bottom" at our October meeting.

"Some people make a big thing about the challenges in dry fly fishing," Lawson said. "Yes, presentation is important, but with the dry fly you have more advantages than when you're nymphing because you can see the fish and you can figure out what they're eating. Fresh from their recent bass exploits down around Bend, Oregon, the fearless foursome of Ken Martin, Norm Prime, Mike Bunney (*Clockwise right*) and Steve Murray (*Taking the pictures*) headed North to British Columbia's fabled Harrison River in search of some friendly chums.

Despite the fact there were plenty of fish in the water, the Harrison turned out to be more "fabled" than fabulous. **"We caught some fish," Norm said, "But basically, the fishing was terrible."**

However, the weather was nice, the beer was cold and they got to race around in a big boat with a big motor and fish from the bank. And, as you can see, they did hook up with some older and quite respectable examples of *Oncorhynchus keta*. That's what happened on the last day when five of the guys stayed an extra day to fish Chopaka.

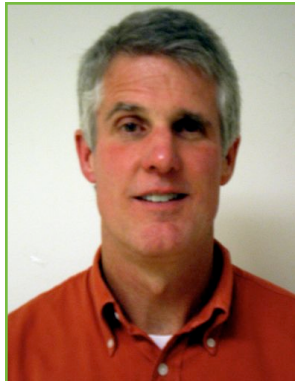
"We were it," said Mike Truax, "We only had a few hours to fish and among the five of us we caught more than 20 fish. Big ones."

you don't know where the fish is and you don't know what it's eating. Blind fishing is the kind of fishing I like least. But it intrigues me because I don't know what's down there."

Lawson's "go to" set up when he's fishing blind near the surface is an EZ Caddis with a post and a caddis pupa on a dropper off the hook bend. If he's fishing deeper he'll probably tie on a bead head Prince Nymph.

But he definitely prefers "sight" fishing to "blind" and encourages everyone to learn how to see fish through the water.

He recalled fishing in New Zealand and "getting a major butt kicking" until one of the guides took him aside a gave him some pointers.

"You need to move slowly and work up stream. Look for shadows on the bottom, look for any movement. It takes time, but spotting fish is often as much fun as fishing.

"When you do see a fish, you need to get in position. Get as close as you can. You'll probably have one shot. Watch the fish. When it moves out of position, then starts to move back into position, just tighten. If you feel resistance, tighten more."

OTHER TIPS

- If you see fish moving, cast to the side they're moving to.

- In fast water most people use too much weight. Rather, stay close to the bank, make short casts and use a high stick tech-

nique to guide the fly with your rod.

- Lawson is a fan of stonefly nymphs because they're available year 'round. He likes simple patterns because the fly is moving fast and the fish has one shot. He suggests a weighted Wolley Worm with legs.
